Dear Friends,

I'm always amazed at how quickly time goes between Christmas and Easter. It seems like only a few weeks ago that we were in the season of Advent, preparing our hearts and our homes for the birth of Jesus, and now, here we are: only a couple weeks away from Holy Week and Easter Sunday! There is no doubt that time goes too fast. And yet, in the midst of busy and fast-paced lives, I hope that this Lenten season has been a meaningful one for you still.

For me, this season has certainly been a busy one as I embark on my first journey to the cross with both Weyauwega and Winneconne, but I have tried to be intentional with my routine, slowing down and finding even little bits of time for prayer and reflection, especially through the practices of lectio divina (sacred reading), visio divina (sacred seeing), and audio divina (sacred listening).

If you haven't heard of these practices before, they're pretty simple. In audio divina, for example, you reflect on a musical piece using a four-step process. First is audio. You listen attentively to the piece and notice a word or phrase that stands out. Second is meditatio. You meditate on that word or phrase, considering its meaning and how it speaks to you in the midst of your life. Third is oratio. You enter into a time of prayer, coming before God with your meditations in mind. And fourth is contemplatio or contemplation. You dwell on the music and your meditations, allowing them to take root in your heart.

Recently I have been engaging in this practice with "Born in the Night, Mary's Child," a hymn that was actually unfamiliar to me until I began my ministry with all of you. It may initially seem like an odd choice because this is a hymn that we just sang during the seasons of Advent and Christmas, but take a look at the third and fourth verses here:

Truth of our life, Mary's Child, you tell us God is good; yes, it is true, Mary's Child, shown on your cross of wood.

Hope of the world, Mary's Child, you're coming soon to reign; King of the earth, Mary's Child, walk in our streets again.

Now, for me, the third verse stands out. In a time when there's so much brokenness and fearfulness in our lives and the world around us, when we're desperate for truth and accurate information, it serves as a powerful reminder that God is good. That is the truth. But more than that, it reminds us that God's goodness isn't just revealed in the times and places that we might think of as good or beautiful or peaceful. God's goodness is revealed even in the brokenness and fearfulness of this earthly life. God's goodness is revealed on the cross where Jesus died.

As we embark on another Holy Week and venture through the excitement of Palm Sunday, the sobriety of Maundy Thursday, the grief and anguish of Good Friday, and the joy of Easter Sunday, let us never lose sight of that truth. God is good.
